cultural competency in California's domestic violence field

As California's communities grow increasingly diverse, differences in social and cultural norms become increasingly important in considering how to provide accessible and high quality domestic violence (DV) services, including outreach, prevention, and advocacy. This is especially true given that certain groups – African Americans, American Indians, and in some cases, recent immigrants and non-English speaking communities (including those of Latina and Asian/Pacific Islander descent) – may experience higher rates of DV than the general population¹. And despite being disproportionately affected by DV, survivors from these communities may be less likely to access services.

Blue Shield of California Foundation recognizes these disparities and is committed to ensuring that comprehensive, high quality DV services are accessible for all survivors and families.

The Needs of Diverse Communities

In response to anecdotal evidence from grantees, the Foundation's domestic violence program, Blue Shield Against Violence, undertook research to document DV rates among different demographic groups and success stories of providers serving Californians in greatest need of help who are not accessing existing DV services. This research found that:

- Due to the economic downturn, service providers are stretched, and as a result, the needs of survivors from diverse communities may be especially underserved;
- Service providers often do not have the adequate support, training, and resources
 to provide services that are responsive to a survivor's cultural and personal
 circumstances; and
- A lack of culturally competent services, including outreach, prevention, and advocacy, may be one barrier to service access for high-need groups.

Cultural competency is the provision of linguistically- and culturally-sensitive – and responsive – services. It is a deep understanding of how someone's specific culture may require different approaches to care, whether that be speaking her language, adapting to religious or cultural customs and preferences, and generally focusing on her individual

What We're Doing

Based on this research, in 2011 Blue Shield Against Violence prioritized cultural competency in order to address the needs of some of the most vulnerable Californians – African Americans, American Indians, and recent immigrants and non-English speaking communities. The Foundation made 17 two-year grants totaling \$2.62 million to:

- Engage DV survivors and community members to increase awareness and to promote practice of culturally competent DV-related outreach, prevention, and advocacy
- Strengthen organizations' DV-related, cultural competency efforts
- Promote a more connected and culturally-competent response to DV among new and existing partners and stakeholders

These grantees will also join a Cultural Competency learning community to problemsolve, reflect on their work, disseminate knowledge, and share lessons learned.
