Women who experience domestic violence are:



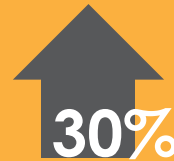
80% more likely to have a stroke.

70% more likely to develop heart disease.

60% more likely to suffer from asthma than women who have not experienced intimate abuse.

Fostering Innovation

The innovative mobile app, *SafeNight*, helps domestic violence organizations locate a safe place for survivors to stay when there are no available shelter beds.

Cultivating Leadership

Since 2010, the Strong Field Project has strengthened more than 60 domestic violence organizations statewide, and helped to empower the individuals leading these organizations on the front lines.

Building Capacity

The Foundation supports over 120 California domestic violence service providers annually, including the provision of core support funding to every shelter in the state.

\$300 million

Since 2002, we have awarded over \$300 million through our Blue Shield Against Violence and Health Care and Coverage programs.

\$7.9 million

In 2013, we awarded \$7.9 million to domestic violence service providers, including 70 new organizations committed to ending domestic violence.
